“Seven Steps to Managing Your Memory”

Dr. Andrew Budson, Professor of Neurology at Boston University, Lecturer in Neurology at Harvard Medical School, and Chief of Cognitive & Behavioral Neurology at the Veterans Affairs Boston Healthcare System

With more than 41 million Americans over the age of 65 in the United States, the question becomes how much (or, perhaps, what type) of memory loss is to be expected as one gets older and what should trigger a visit to the doctor. Wellesley resident Dr. Andrew Budson's book, *Seven Steps to Managing Your Memory* features clinical vignettes and character-based stories that provide real-life examples of how to successfully manage age-related memory loss. His career combines education, research, and clinical care to help those with memory disorders.

“Orchestrating Gershwin in the 21st Century: Nice Work If You Can Get It”

Bill Elliott, Musician, Arranger, Professor and Tony Award Winner

Wayland native Bill Elliott has had a distinguished musical career variously as a keyboardist, songwriter, bandleader, Hollywood composer, recording artist, Broadway orchestrator, guest conductor for symphony orchestras of seven major cities, and Professor in the Contemporary Writing and Production Department of Berklee College of Music. In 2015 he won a Tony Award for best orchestration for the Broadway musical, An American in Paris. In 2012 he was nominated for both Tony and Grammy awards for Broadway's Nice Work if You Can Get It. In 2017 he won a Drama Desk Award for Outstanding Orchestrations for the Broadway Musical Bandstand. This versatile and highly acclaimed musician will give us a rare look into his world, including his process of adapting and arranging George and Ira Gershwin's timeless music for Broadway shows like AN AMERICAN IN PARIS, LADY BE GOOD, and NICE WORK IF YOU CAN GET IT, as well his prodigious work for conductor-soprano Barbara Hannigan and the Boston Pops.

**The Fine Art of Conservation: Masterpieces, Ephemera and Fakes”
Pamela Hatchfield, Robert P. and Carol T. Henderson Head of Objects Conservation at the Museum of Fine Arts Boston**

The conservation of cultural heritage encompasses a deep understanding of how things are made, how they are used, how they age, and what is necessary to best preserve them. Pamela Hatchfield, Robert P. and Carol T. Henderson Head of Objects Conservation at the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston (MFA) will share stories about how objects and sculpture are studied and cared for at the MFA, the complexities of authenticating objects, and the discoveries made possible by careful looking and advanced technologies. She will also reveal what it was like to spend 8 hours underneath the cornerstone of the Massachusetts State House, and talk about the long journey of Paul Revere’s Time Capsule.
