Discussion Re: Possible Land Exchange to Accommodate Senior Center Parking

Documents reviewed for this discussion:

- Memorandum from the Board of Selectmen to the NRC entitled "Summary of Municipal Parking Needs," dated May 23, 2012.
- Email Message to NRC Director Janet Hartke Bowser from Terri Tsagaris, dated May 25, 2012, Re: Proposed Parking Concepts Memo with attached 5 site plans showing conceptual parking layouts on Morton Park to accommodate Senior Center parking and other municipal use parking.
- NRC Meeting Minutes of 12/18/09, 1/08/2010, 1/12/2010, 1/15/2010, 1/27/2010 and 2/24/2010, containing past discussions on possible Morton Park land exchange for Senior Center parking.

- Email Message to Janet Bowser, NRC Director, from Town Resident Mary Ann Cluggish, encouraging the NRC to not give away any Town green space in the center of Town for a parking lot.
- Email Message to Janet Hartke Bowser, NRC Director, from Town Resident Sarah Norwood encouraging the NRC to preserve Morton Park and not consider a land swap.
- Email Message to Janet Bowser, NRC Director, from Town Resident Bill Mone to not exchange any open space for parking on Morton Park.

Ms. King stated that the Board of Selectmen requested a meeting with the NRC to continue their previous discussions regarding a possible land exchange involving Morton Park. Ms. King stated that in December of 2009 and continuing through February of 2010, the NRC met six times with representatives from the Board of Selectmen to discuss the Selectmen's efforts to find a possible site where additional parking spaces could be located near the previous American Legion site at 494 Washington Street, the current location proposed for the Senior Center. She stated that as currently proposed, the American Legion site would have 34 on-site parking spaces, but the Board of Selectmen believe that this will not be adequate to accommodate the parking needs of the Senior Center, and the Selectmen are attending the NRC Meeting tonight to explore with the NRC the idea of using a portion of NRC land at Morton Park for parking for the Senior Center, Police Station, and the Wellesley Housing Authority.

Ms. Tsagaris reviewed the memorandum sent to the NRC entitled: "Summary of Municipal Parking Needs," dated May 23, 2012, as well as accompanying proposed conceptual parking site plans. Ms. Tsagaris stated that the Board of Selectmen would like to negotiate a land swap with the NRC for a municipal lot that will address the parking needs for a Senior Center, expanded spaces for the Police Station, and additional parking for the Wellesley Housing Authority. Ms. Tsagaris reviewed the parking needs for the Senior Center and said that the peak parking need was addressed in a previous parking study three years ago and was identified as 56 spaces. She stated that the Senior Center site is currently designed to hold 34 parking spaces and there are also an additional 47 spaces on Washington Street, but it is likely that this would be reduced to 41 on-street parking spots as a result of curb cuts and site lines. Ms. Tsagaris stated that the Board of Selectmen are also looking at the possibility of utilizing Wellesley Housing Authority land adjacent to the NRC's Morton Park that could be reconfigured to accommodate additional municipal parking needs as well. She stated that these needs include additional parking as well as a reconfiguration of additional parking at the Police Station to accommodate a widening of the driveway. Ideally, she stated that the new lot would provide a total of 55 parking spaces and would include up to 30 new spaces for the Senior Center, approximately 20 new spaces for the Police Station, and 3-5 additional spaces for the Wellesley Housing Authority. Ms. Tsagaris stated that based on a thorough review of all data by the Board of Selectmen that some portion of land at Morton Park is necessary to address the parking needs of the proposed Senior Center, the Police Station and the Wellesley Housing Authority. She stated that the proposals will include use of approximately 8,297 square feet of land belonging to the Wellesley Housing Authority, as shown on a number of the site plans submitted to the NRC. Ms. Tsagaris stated that the Selectmen have recommitted themselves to pursuing a Senior Center at 496 Washington Street and they would like to further pursue a land swap with the NRC for these parking needs. Ms. Tsagaris stated that in reviewing the data from the traffic study that the Board of Selectmen conducted two years ago on this area that they predict that only 56 spaces will be needed for the center, as opposed to the 84 spaces initially thought necessary.

Ms. King opened the floor for questions by the NRC Members. Ms. Gross stated that although she is strongly in favor of a Senior Center, the NRC is elected to protect open space and that their goal is to enhance and expand parkland wherever they can find it, and that, in general, the NRC does not give up parkland for parking. Mr. Murphy stated that land taken as parkland under Massachusetts State Law, shall forever be kept open or maintained as parkland and such land can only be exchanged for other uses under an extensive 3-step process that includes approval by the NRC, by Town Meeting and by the State Legislature. He noted that this is a tenuous and lengthy process and the goal is to ensure that open space is protected to the greatest extent possible.

Ms. Gaughan asked if the Board of Selectmen had revisited the possible acquisition of the property next to the American Legion site, which had previously been before Town Meeting. Ms. Searle stated that Town Meeting approved \$1 million for the purchase of the land but the property owner asked for \$1.2 million and they were unable to come to agreement at that time. Ms. Gross strongly recommended that acquisition of this parcel be revisited and that the Board of Selectmen reengage this owner in negotiations to see if this land would be an option for purchase. Ms. Gross asked about other alternative sites for parking in this area, either on street or on land already owned by the Board of Selectmen. Ms. Tsagaris stated that there is land on the aqueduct behind the Needham Bank that holds approximately 17 parking spaces that is currently being used for parking for high school students and they will look into using this space for Senior Center parking. She stated that she will also look at the potential use of shuttle buses from other parking areas. The NRC said that before they would consider a potential land swap, they would like to see a memorandum outlining all alternative sites that have been evaluated for parking for the Senior Center including numbers and pros and cons for each alternative area, including along Washington Street. Ms. Gross noted that she and several other NRC Members have received calls from residents and Town Meeting Members encouraging the NRC to not to give up open space for parking in this area. Ms. Gaughan voiced concerns that placing a parking lot across the street from the Senior Center could potentially result in a dangerous situation for seniors attempting to cross Washington Street.

Ms. Tsagaris stated that their traffic engineer had estimated underground parking for the Senior Center at \$100,000 per space, potentially creating up to \$3,500,000 for the 35 spaces needed. She stated that the property adjacent to the American Legion site was offered at a cost of \$1.2 million and would provide an additional 35- 40 parking spaces. Ms. Tsagaris stated that the Board of Selectmen would attempt to reengage this property owner as purchasing that land would be a cost-effective alternative at this point.

Ms. Babson noted that while the NRC received a number of phone calls opposing the land swap, the majority of people attending the meeting tonight, approximately 65 people, are all interested and supportive of a Senior Center and would like the two boards to explore all options.

Ms. King opened the floor for questions from those in the audience.

Mr. Peter Ophenhartz of 9 Smith Street stated that in his experience there is no problem crossing Route 16 at this location as there is a traffic light at St. Paul's that would allow residents to cross safely.

Janet Healy of 32 Denton Road, spoke in favor of a land swap, and said that she lives next to Fuller Brook Park and remembers when Morton Park hosted carnivals at the site, and noted that there should be some flexibility regarding the use of this park for other municipal needs.

Mr. John Schuler, a member of the Wellesley Housing Authority Board, noted that the Wellesley Housing Authority had approved the use of some of their land at this location for public parking for community use. He stated that they support a public land swap for a Senior Center, but that it would be important to retain plantings along Route 16 that would screen a public parking area. He stated that he does not feel that crossing Route 16 is that dangerous and that people have been crossing it for many years without a problem. He stated that the Wellesley Housing Authority that oversees the Morton Circle Public Housing had previous discussions with the Board of Selectmen and had approved plans to widen the driveway into the Police Station and Morton Circle and he believes that this was an item in the Board of Selectmen's FY13 budget plan and had received funding.

Susan Lange of 24 Cornell Road and Vice Chair of the Council on Aging stated that although she strongly supports efforts to protect open space, she also stressed that there is a strong need for the Senior Center and that many seniors need to meet indoors in such a facility. She encouraged the NRC to work with the Board of Selectmen and she strongly endorses a land swap but only after the Board of Selectmen have evaluated all other sites as alternatives to a land swap. She stated that she believes that she speaks for a large number of seniors attending the meeting tonight who hope that the NRC is open to the idea of a land swap and that they will work collaboratively with the Board of Selectmen to pursue this end. She asked for a show of hands of residents who are attending the meeting in support of a Senior Center and a majority of those in attendance raised their hands.

Members of the NRC confirmed their strong support for a Senior Center, but stated that was not the issue on the table tonight and the issue was whether or not it was in the Town's best interest to give up open space for parking when other parking locations alternatives may be available.

Ms. Mary Bowers, a member of the Council on Aging, stated that she is excited that the Board of Selectmen have recommitted to building a Senior Center and she is aware that the NRC is not opposed to a Senior Center, but is committed to preserving open space, and she urged all Town Boards to work together to ensure that the Board of Selectmen keep a new Senior Center as a priority for the Town and that it is long overdue as a resource for seniors and asked all Town Boards to step up and make the Senior Center happen.

Barbara Ophenhartz, 9 Smith Street, stated that she and others would like to be made aware of future meetings that discuss the Senior Center and the potential for a land swap and it would be helpful if the Board of Selectmen could identify the pros and cons for all of the parking alternatives and the Board of Selectmen should be as transparent as possible in the decision making process for the Senior Center.

Mr. Louis Bowles of Wilson Street stated that the municipal parking area next to the Needham Bank could provide a good parking location for the Senior Center.

Ms. Tsagaris thanked the NRC for the opportunity to attend the meeting to discuss the Senior Center and the next step would be for the Board of Selectmen to address the NRC's questions and to outline all alternative parking locations for a Senior Center. She also asked for the NRC's support in forming a subcommittee between the Board of Selectmen and the NRC. Ms. King stated that the NRC was in agreement to form a subcommittee and there will be further communications regarding this matter.

Discussion with Board of Selectmen Re: Special Town Meeting Warrant Article 4 Regarding Funding Issues Related to the Morses Pond Northern Basin Dredging Project

Ms. King stated that she wanted to convey to the Board of Selectmen the NRC's strong support for retaining the original \$500,000 debt exclusion for the Morses Pond Northern Basin Dredging Project. Ms. King stated that it has come to the NRC's attention that the Selectmen's Director and the Town Accountant are proposing that this previously approved debt-exclusion funding be revoked by Town Meeting at the Special Town Meeting scheduled for June 13, 2012 and the NRC is not supportive of this effort.

Discussion Re: St. James Recreational Complex Proposal and Land Acquisition for Special Town Meeting

Ms. Gaughan stated that she has been requested by Ms. Babson, Chair of the St. James Ad Hoc Committee, to ask the NRC to vote on the St. James Recreational Complex Proposal that will be coming before Special Town Meeting on June 13, 2012. Ms. King noted that previously the NRC had discussed this proposal in great detail and their vote was in support of acquiring the land, but not necessarily for recreational purposes at this time, as in her view, the St. James Recreational Complex Proposal is not sufficiently developed and she would not be comfortable in supporting only the recreational plan at this time. There was further discussion by the NRC about a vote in support of a plan for recreational uses at the site. Ms. Gaughan stated that in her opinion, she feels that the NRC should support the recreational plan because it puts less pressure on the NRC to use other open space for playing fields, and because the site provides a connection to other Town trails, although it is not a direct connection. **After further discussion, a motion was made and seconded and the NRC voted 4-0 to support the opportunity for the Town to further evaluate the 900 Worcester Street site for potential recreational uses including connections to the Town's trail system.**

Discussion Re: Fuller Brook Park Volunteer Invasives Removal Program

Document reviewed for this discussion:

- Email Message from Fuller Brook Park Coordinating Committee Member Herb Nolan to NRC Director Janet Bowser, dated May 3, 2012, regarding a test run for invasive removals at Fuller Brook Park.
- Memorandum to the Wellesley NRC from Fuller Brook Park Consultant Peter Jackson from Park Planning Associates, dated May 15, 2012, regarding Volunteer Invasives Plant Removal at Fuller Brook Park.

Ms. Bowser reviewed the memorandum from Mr. Jackson with the NRC and stated that several members of the newly formed Friends of Fuller Brook Park approached the NRC with the idea of organizing a volunteer effort to remove invasive plants from the park. Invasive species management is a serious concern at the park and will be the subject of a large capital project as well as on-going maintenance planning undertaken as part of the park's preservation project. The NRC was in agreement that it was too early in the planning effort to begin wholesale invasives management as the determination of priorities in target species and acceptable management techniques, including the possibility of using herbicides, has not been agreed upon. The NRC, however, agreed that it is desirable to capture the energy and enthusiasm of volunteers and to support the formation of the Friends Group.

The NRC welcomed Herb Nolan, a member of the Fuller Brook Park Coordinating Committee, Kurt Summerville, of the Friends of Fuller Brook Park Volunteer Group, and Bob White of the Fuller Brook Park Coordinating Committee, to the meeting to discuss options for the volunteer effort to remove invasive plants at the Fuller Brook Park. The NRC stated that they believe that it is possible to support specific volunteer efforts to remove invasive plants at this time as outlined in the scope and goals in Mr. Jackson's memo. It was the general consensus of the NRC that this volunteer effort should be directed at cutting and removing above ground invasives and should not involve below ground removal or the use of any herbicides or any work near a wetland resource area and all work should take place upland.

The NRC and those in attendance reviewed the memorandum to the Wellesley NRC from Mr. Jackson who recommended that the removal at this point in time be limited to the following six woody species: oriental bittersweet, common buckthorn, Japanese barberry, multi-floral rose, wing euonymus and Norway Maple. Mr. Jackson recommended that all invasive removal areas be restricted to the plant areas of the park away from the stream bank and that the work be closely coordinated with the DPW so that they can be prepared to pickup and dispose of any cut material. Mr. Jackson recommended that these efforts be concentrated in one section of the park at a time and that cuttings be placed in piles for ease of collection by Town departments. In support of this effort, Mr. Jackson attached an outline of possible steps needed to organize such an effort, as well as photographs of the plant specifics, and as well as more detailed biology identifying characteristics of each species. Mr. Jackson emphasized that at this time he recommends only cutting and removal of the above ground growth. He also noted that someone from the Town DPW will need to assist and train volunteers in species identification and also in removal techniques.

There was further discussion regarding the volunteer organization effort required. Mr. Summerville noted that he was confident that he could organize a sizeable number of volunteers and he and Mr. Nolan are willing to be trained and then they could train other volunteers. Ms. King stated that the volunteers would need to work at least four times a year to keep up and make a productive impact on invasive removals. Ms. King stated that a plan would need to be developed that identified the what the volunteers would do at this point and what management strategy they would follow. She stated that the NRC does not want to bring in volunteers and then have them frustrated by not having them make a significant impact on invasive species removal efforts.

After further discussion, it was the sense of the NRC that the volunteers would focus at this point on the removal of invasives as identified by Mr. Jackson in his memo and that Ms. Gross will contact Town Landscape Planner Cricket Vlass to further coordinate this effort. It was noted that at a previous Fuller Brook Park Coordinating Committee Meeting, Mike Pakstis had volunteered the resources of Ms. Vlass to help with this effort. It was agreed that Ms. Gross will follow-up with Ms. Vlass to identify specific areas for the removal of invasives as well as set up a training scheduled and prioritize removals section removal area. **After further discussion, a motion was made and seconded and the NRC voted 4-0 to support the development of a volunteer invasive removal effort in the Fuller Brook Park that will initially focus on the above ground removal of 6 species of invasives that are upland and are not in a wetland area, and that Ms. Gross will work with Ms. Vlass to assist the volunteers with training and with the on-site removals and that there will be further discussions with Mr. Jackson regarding the development of the Fuller Brook Park Invasive Species Removal Plan.**

Ms. Gross will keep the NRC informed as progress is made on this project.

Review and Discussion Re: June 13, 2012 Special Town Meeting NRC Warrant Articles 4 & 5 Related to Morses Pond

Ms. King stated that in regard to Article 4 that the Board of Selectmen will be discussing this matter at their meeting on June 4th, and the Selectmen's Director and Town Accountant would like to rescind the original \$500,000 for the Morses Pond Northern Basin Dredging Project under Article 4. The NRC discussed this matter and felt strongly that they needed to take a formal vote in opposition to this funding strategy. **After further discussion, a motion was made and seconded and the NRC voted 4-0 to strongly support retaining the original \$500,000 previously voted by Town Meeting and Town residents in a debt exclusion vote to fund the Morses Pond Northern Basin Dredging Project and that the debt exclusion should not be rescinded and should be retained and that the only request at the Special Town Meeting should be for the additional Community Preservation Act supplemental appropriation of \$400,000 for the project.**

Ms. Bowser stated that she will circulate this vote to members of the Community Preservation Committee, Board of Selectmen, Board of Public Works, Recreation Commission, and Friends of Morses Pond Liaison Susan Hurwitz.

There was further discussion regarding Special Town Meeting Article 5, which involves the transfer of Morses Pond operating funds for education outreach efforts from the expense category to the personnel expense category thereby allowing the NRC's Environmental Education Coordinator to work an additional nine hours per week on Morses Pond issues. Ms. Ann Marie Gross, the Advisory Committee Liaison to the NRC, indicated that the Advisory Committee has not taken a formal vote on this Article and she will keep the NRC updated on the status of the Advisory's vote on this matter.

NRC Vote to Appoint Two NRC Members to the Senior Center Subcommittee with Board of Selectmen Discussion

After further discussion, a motion was made and seconded and the NRC voted 4-0 to appoint Ms. King and Mr. Murphy to represent the NRC on a Subcommittee to evaluate the potential land swap for parking for the Senior Center at Morton Park.

Director's Report

Fuller Brook Park Preservation Project Phase 3 Update and State St. Pond Dredging Project

Ms. Bowser briefly updated the NRC on the status of this project and indicated that the consultant on the project will evaluate the State St. Pond for possible dredging, and she will keep the NRC updated on the status of this project.

Update on the NRC Sustainable Landscape/Rain Garden Workshop, May 1, 2012

Ms. Bowser stated that this workshop was very well attended with over 45 individuals in attendance and that a packet of information regarding Sustainable Landscapes and Low Impact Development/Stormwater Protection Efforts was distributed to each attendee. Ms. Bowser also stated that the workshop was covered by the Wellesley cable station and she will request a DVD which can be placed on the NRC's website.

NRC May 12, 2012 Vernal Pool Workshop Report

Ms. Bowser stated that the NRC's May 12th Vernal Pool Workshop was very well attended and that due to the very dry spring and winter there was not a convenient vernal pool in Wellesley to visit,

and the group went to the Broadmoor Sanctuary in Natick to complete the outdoor component of the workshop.

NRC Rain Garden and Stormwater Management Improvement Project Installation at Morses Pond Beach, May 19, 2012

Ms. Bowser stated that the installation of this project went extremely well and that it came in under budget and on schedule and the installation was attended by over 35 residents. She stated that the NRC consultant video-taped a good portion of the installation and additional photos were taken and that she will draft a press release on this project. She also stated that there was good media coverage on the project by the *Wellesley Patch* and the *Townsmen*. She stated that she will be monitoring the rain garden and the other LID components as they become well established and that permanent signage will be installed. She also stated that she was contacted by the Charles River Watershed Association who would like to come and see the project.

NRC Strategic Plan Development Meetings – June 1 and June 16, 2012

Ms. Bowser briefly updated the NRC on the Strategic Plan Development that they will be undertaking with a consultant and that she will circulate information prior to the meetings for their review.

May 10th Inter-Board FY14 Budget Meeting Report

Ms. Bowser distributed information that was submitted at this inter-board budget meeting and stated that the Board of Selectmen will be making additional requests to the elected boards regarding the impact of the FY14 Budget Guidelines.

Boulder Brook Reservation Tree Restoration Project/Use of Goats for Removal of Invasives

Ms. Bowser updated the NRC and stated that the goats were actively eating invasives in Boulder Brook Reservation for three days last week. She stated that Ms. King helped to oversee this effort, which was also overseen by the NRC's Consulting Arborist Dave Hawkins. The general sense was that this invasives removal effort went very well with the goats feeding on invasives and their herders following and physically pulling out the plants. Mr. Hawkins indicated that we should know the overall effectiveness in the next 3 months and then make a decision if additional work is needed to further control invasives. Mr. Hawkins indicated that he will inspect the area in the fall before meeting with Tree Specialists at the site to decide if any additional follow-up is needed. Ms. King noted that she coordinated extensive publicity around the use of the goats and there was good coverage in the *Boston Globe*, the *Townsmen* and the *Wellesley Patch*.

Morses Pond Comprehensive Management Plan – Spring and Summer Implementation Update

Ms. Bowser briefly updated the NRC on the current implementation of the Morses Pond Comprehensive Management Plan, including the weed harvesting program, the Phosphorus Inactivation Unit, and further preparation for the Morses Pond Dredging Effort.

High School Seniors' Project Re: Development of Water Resources Protection Curriculum

Ms. Bowser stated that three high school seniors worked in the NRC Office for approximately six weeks on a project to develop a Water Resources Protection Curriculum under the guidance of Ms. King. Both Ms. Bowser and Ms. King said the effort was positive and they look forward to using this curriculum for environmental protection efforts.

Poison Ivy Treatment Proposed by DPW at Ouellette and Perrin Park

Ms. Bowser stated that the DPW had received concerns from a number of residents about the need to treat poison ivy around Ouellette Park and in Perrin Park, and Mr. Quinn, Parks Superintendent, is requesting permission from the NRC to treat these areas with a limited application of a herbicide to control the plant which could be hazardous to some park users. **After further discussion, a motion was made and seconded and the NRC voted 4-0 to allow limited herbicide treatment for poison ivy at Ouellette Park and Perrin Park, as allowed under the NRC's IPM Policy.**

New Business/Continuing Business/Liaison Reports

Brookside Community Gardens Update

Ms. Bowser stated that through attrition and turn-over, the NRC has been able to move 12 people off the Brookside Waitlist this year. Ms. Bowser stated that she and Ms. King and Mr. Seaborn are working with representatives from the Brookside Gardens to review the current Rules and Regulations and to create an advisory board that will take the lead on administrating and overseeing the management of the gardens. Ms. Bowser distributed the new draft Rules and Regulations, which the NRC briefly discussed

Lower Falls Bridge /Charles River Park Dedication Update

Ms. Bowser stated that she, Mr. Seaborn, and Ms. King attended the dedication ceremony for the new bridge in this location, which Mr. Seaborn had spearheaded.

Review and Approval of NRC April 30, 2012 Meeting Minutes

After a motion was made and seconded, the NRC voted 4-0 to approve the Meeting Minutes of April 30, 2012 as written.

Next NRC Meeting Schedule

The next NRC meeting was scheduled for June 1, 2012, which will be the NRC's Strategic Planning Meeting. The next NRC meeting was scheduled for June 13, 2012 at 6:45 PM in Wellesley High School, prior to the Special Town Meeting

Adjournment

After a motion was made and seconded, the NRC voted 4-0 to adjourn the meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 11 PM.
